The Internationals

Lauro Wollner of Brazil was not only hot on everyone's trail, but would have taken the Juniors if he had not been protested and dropped to second place.

Both Mario Simoes and Lauro showed incredibly consistent skill and boat speed, but so did Gary, who wrested the Senior Penguin Championship from Brazil for the first time in six years.

The Junior Championships were about to start on Monday when a severe squall came up. The 28 Juniors were gathered in tow as half-inch hailstones pelted them. Only one boat crashed. Jeannine Byrne, S.A. Correspondent, was on a tow boat and reported that lightning struck a large sailboat moored in the harbor as they were passing by. "There was a mild shock, but we kept going!" Races were cancelled for the day.

The second day saw the Race Committee bent on getting the series in despite light and variable winds. The Juniors were out till 8 p.m., but they got their five races, and awards were duly presented.

This was also the big measurement day for the Seniors. "What do you mean, cut my mast 1/8 inch!" "There's a difference between a taped band and a painted band?" "What window?" Carl was very strict.

Day one for the Seniors (Wednesday) was fraught with light-air complications. Then rain. Start, recall, recall. Start, recall, recall. Finally, a race got off. Everyone had bunched up at the Committee Boat, but Gary Knapp took the pin end and cleared air so fast that there was no contest. Unfortunately, by the time he gybed around the weather mark, the Committee called the race due to a wind shift. The second race of the day was thrown out on protest because not all of the boats over were recalled.

That left day two (Thursday) with a very nervous committee and very short-tempered sailors. Everyone dripped swelter as a rather meticulous Race Committee set and reset the pin and weather mark. Again, recall, recall, recall. By the fourth start, the fleet went.

Q: How many Penguins can fit through the eye of a needle at the pin end?

A: All of them. Only there's a general recall.

Consistent as ever, Lauro and Mario formed a guard, but Ed Coneys ghosted through. In about an hour, the wind filled in from the south at about 10, and the

fleet started to scoot from the rear. However, Ed's lead was sizeable enough to take race one.

Races two and three were super Penguin weather: about 10-15 knots. Some chop built up in the second race, but was down by the third, and a satisfied flock of Penguins, led by Gary Knapp, headed home in the setting sun.

Not everyone was without troubles, though. Carlos Rivero from Argentina had the sail pull out of the mast. Bruce Atkinson from Setauket broke his mast. Bruce Goldsmith from Chicago broke his tiller. Phil Hallisey on a crash boat zoomed in to shore to get the spare. "Don't worry, Bruce. I'll have it back out by the third recall." That was the *one* race where there were *no* recalls.

Friday was hot, hazy, and airless again as Penguins formed that Endless Tow Line to the start. A zephyr came in after noon, and the race went off. However, a big, blue-gray cloud from the west hovered closer and closer. The race finished with a bang and a fireworks display from Mother Nature.

Someone earlier had asked Carl Cheney if he was requiring anchors.

"Yes."

"Why?"

"Because the next stop from here is the Azores."

Many anchors scraped the bottom and held enough. But after the squall, crash boats went rounding up stray Penguins that had gotten blown out in winds that, I would estimate, went over 50 knots.

Because the rest of the day looked just as threatening, races were cancelled.

That evening, awards were given to the top 10 finishers and their crews. Gary Knapp took the Perpetual Trophy and First Challenge Trophy, as well as First in the Seniors. Other special awards were the Jane Marshall Trophy for the highest placing girl in the Juniors, which went to skipper Clay Dudley; The Flo Drill Trophy for the best woman crew in the Seniors went to Mary Abbene (took Fourth with skipper Joe Yacoe); the Long Distance Trophy went to George Sztzern of Argentina; and the Over Forty Trophy to Mel Reid.

As Gary Knapp was returning to his seat after receiving his trophies, there were cries of "Knapper! Knapper! *Aiiii Riight*, Knapper!" from his friends. It was a touching moment as he paused, blushed, and started to giggle, as if it suddenly hit that he was indeed the International Penguin Champion.

Yes, Knapper, you *really* did do it!
